Fire Department

HELP WANTED: The fire
department could use your
help! Talk to a member of
the fire department about
becoming a member.

Home fire safety should
always be a top priority.
There are very simple steps
you can take to ensure that
important steps are
acknowledged. Home safety
means keeping your family
and home safe from the
devastations of fire. It is
almost entirely about
prevention. A little bit of
prevention can go a long
way in keep your family and
home safe.

Some of the precautions
necessary for maximum
safety include making sure
there is a working smoke
detector in each room,
keeping your valuables in a
fire-proof safe, keeping
flammable and dangerous
items out of the reach of
children, and creating a fire
evacuation plan. You can
also practice a
comprehensive evacuation
plan to keep everyone safe.

Another thing you can do is
to make sure that all of the
exits are easily accessible.
Debris, garbage, and

obstacles can create
dangerous hazards because
they can stop people from
getting out, or stop rescue
workers and fire fighters from
coming in to find children
and other family members.

Children should also have a
clear understanding of what
to do in case of a fire, and
what to do in case their
clothes should catch on fire.

There's no need to live in
fear. All you need to do takes
some simple, common-
sense precautions, fresh
batteries, and a clear plan.

CHANGE YOUR CLOCK CHANGE YOUR BATTERIES

Change the batteries in your
smoke alarms and carbon
monoxide detectors when
you turn back your clocks for
Daylight Saving Time. Make
sure to check the alarms with
the new batteries installed.
